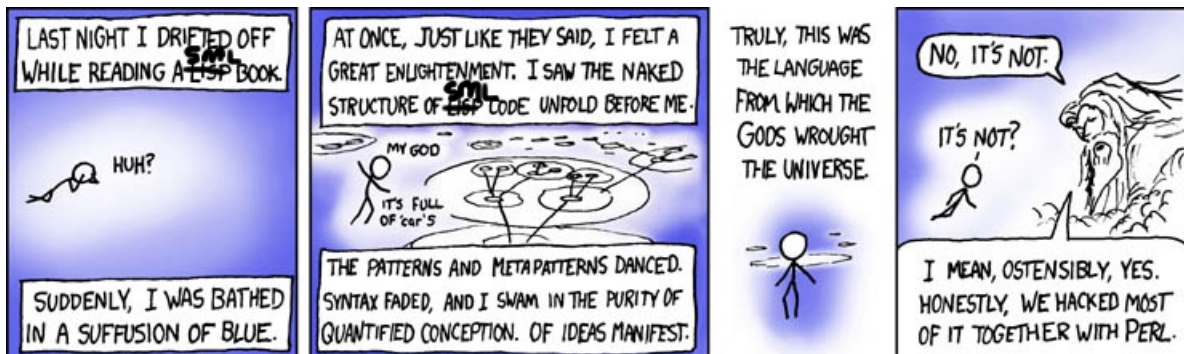


CS52 - Assignment 0

This assignment is simply to check out that you have access to and can use the SML system. It is not factored into your course grade, but it is important that you complete it on time so that we can solve any problems that arise.

Reading

In addition to the readings from the course handouts (i.e. make sure you've read Part I from *A Brief Introduction to SML*), I *strongly* suggest that you also become familiar with some of the SML books that I have suggested (and have made available to you in the lab). There is no single one good book, so check out a few of them and see which one suits you best.

Take a look at the first few chapters of Ullman's book, Section 1.6 of Pucella's notes, the chapter "Simple Applicative Programming" by Gilmore, and Chapter 2 of Harper.

Academic Honesty

The Assignment

1. If you have never taken a CS class at Pomona College, obtain an account on the Computer Science Department's system. See *A Brief Introduction to SML* for information on obtaining an account and/or changing your password if you've forgotten it.
2. One of the goals of this class is to get you more comfortable using the command-line (aka as "Terminal" for Macs).
 - (a) Follow the instructions in *A Brief Introduction to SML* to create a directory named `cs52` for your work in this course.
 - (b) Make sure you understand the basic commands on page 7 and spend 10 minutes glancing through some of the resources under "Unix" to get a bit more comfortable with other commands available.
 - (c) Try out a few commands :)
3. Create a file named `assign0.sml` which will hold your submission for this assignment.

Below I've included a skeleton for the assignment for you to refer to. Do not copy and paste from this document to complete the steps below. Instead, *type* them. I know this may seem a bit tedious, but I want you to get comfortable with Emacs, formatting, parenthesis matching, etc. (humor me :).

- (a) *Type* the header comments with your name, the date, assignment number, etc.
- (b) *Type* in the `numList` function along with the provided comments. Before moving on to the next step, load (i.e. "use") your file in SML and then test to see that your `numList` function works by calling it with a number.
- (c) *Type* in the `sumIntegers` function. Look at the code and see if you can figure out what this function does. Add an appropriately formatted comment stating what it does. Make sure you follow proper convention (look at the other examples or the examples from class). Once you think you've got it figured out, again, load your file in SML and run the `sumIntegers` function and make sure it does what you think it does :)
- (d) *Type* in the `sumFormula` function along with the comments and test it.
- (e) *Type* in the `sameValues` function along with the comments and test it.
- (f) *Type* in the four statements at the end of the file. See if you can figure out what these four lines are doing. Load/run the file (i.e. using "use") and then see what values they generate. *Add a comment above these four lines summarizing what they do.*

4. At this point you should have a complete assignment with comments at the top, four function declarations all with comments describing them and a set of statements at the bottom with a comment describing them. Submit your assignment via the online submission mechanism.
